## United Fund, Seven Nat'l Agencies Benefit From Drive

Sandia employees first "once and for all" fund drive starts this Friday.

Known as the Sandia Employees Contribution Plan, the drive will collect funds for distribution among 31 different health and welfare agencies in this area.

Beginning Friday, approximately 1,000 volunteer solicitors will contact every Sandia employee in Albuquerque, giving them the opportunity to contribute by payroll deduction to the agencies listed elsewhere in this issue of the Sandia Lab News. Cash contributions will also be accepted.

The drive will be concentrated into three days, Friday, Oct. 18 and Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 21 and 22.

Payroll deductions may extend over an entire year. Payments to

the various organizations will be made monthly from the fund.

A committee of employees, headed by D. S. Tarbox (2440), has established a percentage allocation of funds to the organizations included in the group to receive the benefits of Sandia's solicitation. Following is the division:

These percentages are based on amounts raised by the agencies in relationship to the totals raised by

all of them in recent Bernalillo County drives.

The Albuquerque United Fund goal this year is \$429,000. The Sandia Corporation quota for the United Fund is \$72,000. An additional \$23,000 is being sought for the seven national health agencies participating in Employees Contribution Plan.

Two agencies, The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and The Tuberculosis Association, were offered the opportunity to participate in the Plan but declined.

Employees who contribute will be given window stickers and wallet-sized cards identifying them as contributors to the Sandia plan.

A new feature of the "Once and For All" drive is creation of a fund to be used in emergencies. If con-

ditions during the year do not result in the fund being depleted it will be apportioned among the agencies in proper ratio. No money will be carried over from year to year.

Previous performances of Sandia Corporation employees in Community Chest and United Fund Drives tell a story of steady improvement.

### Sandia's E. W. Kersten One of First To Hear Russian Satellite Signal

Visiting regularly via ham radio with Antarctica is old hat to Ernest "Kernie" Kersten (7113) but recently his visit was interrupted with exciting news—a new unidentified radio signal had been received at the South Pole. Later this signal was confirmed by the Russians as being transmitted from their satellite.

As well as can be determined, the South Pole pick up of the signal was the first American reception and Kernie, by hearing it relayed from there was one of the first to hear it.


The signal from the satellite, as Kernie heard it, was a high whine, rapidly pulsing and changing slightly in pitch. It was coming in on 20.005 and 40.002 megacycles.

His contacts in Antarctica are Kenneth Hailstorm, naval radio

operator from Gallup, and Carl Ekland, civilian scientist with the group on the pole making observations for International Geophysical year activities. Kernie and other ham operators like him are the only contacts to the outside world that the explorers have. Messages and phone calls to families are handled by the radio operators.

## Former Consultant For Sandia Honored By Franklin Institute

The Franklin Institute in Philadelphia is today honoring a former Sandia Corporation research consultant for designs and inventions developed during 38 years with the Bell System.

Warren W. Carpenter is being awarded the John Price Wetherill Medal for "his important contributions in the field of switching, including the invention of the Automatic Message Accounting System and many related inventions fundamental to the technology of modern telephone switching."

The switching system to which he contributed research work made possible automatic connections between telephones regardless of distance separating them. The message system makes possible automatic accounting of long-distance data (such as caller's number, recipient's number and length of call) directly on the subscriber's bill.

Since his retirement from the Bell System in 1951, Mr. Carpenter has served as a consultant for several firms, including Sandia Corporation.

## Sandia Scientists Teaching Classes In Calculus and Geometry at UNM


Richard C. Hildner (5122) and Howard H. Wicke (5126) are teaching calculus and geometry courses at the University of New Mexico this fall.

# 'Fair Share' Giving Explained

"How much should I give?"

This is a question every conscientious contributor will be asking when the Employees Contribution Fund campaign gets underway Friday. Everyone must answer the question for himself, based on personal circumstances, but to provide a frame of reference the Committee has several suggestions.

This year the downtown United Fund drive is featuring a "Fair Share" formula, and the Commit-

tee has obtained reprints of the leaflet which will be delivered to each employee for information and guidance. The "Fair Share" formula is based on a contribution equal to one hour's pay per month or 1 1/2 day's pay per year. Although the formula was worked out for the support of the 24 UF agencies in Albuquerque, the Sandia committee is of the opinion that a contribution in that amount is generous enough to

support the seven additional agencies included in the Sandia Employees Fund.

Another method of determining how much to give is to do some slightly more complicated mathematics using this formula:

L + 10% - 75% = C, where "L" is last year's contribution and "C" is this year's.

The United Fund must raise 10 percent more than last year to meet minimum responsibilities to the 24 participating agencies, so everyone is asked to increase his own gift that much. With the UF getting 75 per cent of our fund, the total is obtained by dividing 75 into the devised UF gift. Thus, if you gave \$15 to UF last year, adding 10 per cent would make your UF contribution \$16.50 this year. As 75 per cent of your total gift, this makes your total \$22 or \$1.80 per month by payroll deduction.

### Patents Issued to Sandia Employees

Patents have been issued recently to Conrad W. Roeschke (1456) for a pulse generator and to Robert B. Wilds and John R. Ames (both 1423) for a line-above-ground attenuator. The patents were assigned to the Atomic Energy Commission.

Mr. Roeschke's device provides a means of triggering itself automatically or provides a means by which an external trigger may control the functions of the pulse generator. Principal uses of the pulse generator are in timing devices, counters and radar installations. It was developed while Mr. Roeschke was working in the Radar Advanced Development Division. It is his fourth patent.

The line-above-ground attenuator is for the purpose of precision reduction of microwave power in co-axial line systems. It was developed by the two Sandians while performing Corporation studies in the Radio Frequency Components Division.

## Veterans Can Apply For State Tax Exemptions Here Next Week

Special arrangements have been made by Employee Services Division 3122 to aid employees who are New Mexico veterans obtain certificates of eligibility for state property tax exemptions.

Under a new law scheduled to go into effect in 1959 but a requirement of the Bernalillo County Assessor for 1958, veterans must apply for a certificate of eligibility to receive the \$2,000 property tax exemption allowed for veterans.

Representative of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, George O. Breece, Post No. 401, will be on hand next week, Monday, Oct. 21 through Wednesday, Oct. 23, from 1 to 4 p.m. each afternoon in Bldg. 829 with the application blanks and to help employees complete the forms.

To be eligible for the exemption, a veteran must have served at

least 90 days in the armed forces during any of the following dates: April 6, 1917, to Nov. 11, 1918 for World War I; Dec. 7, 1941 to Sept. 2, 1945, for World War II; and June 25, 1950 to July 27, 1953, for the Korean War. To be eligible, World War I veterans shall have established residence in New Mexico prior to Jan. 1, 1934; WW II veterans prior to Jan. 1, 1947.

The new law will make an exception in the residence requirement for Korean Vets. The new provision will allow a tax exemption for a Korean veteran who established residence in New Mexico prior to Jan. 1, 1955.

To apply for the certificate of eligibility, a veteran will need to show proof of his service dates, preferably a discharge or release from service form, and a copy of his voting registration would be helpful.
